

We are pleased to present our 2021 Annual Report, summarizing the achievements and successes from January 1 to December 31, 2021.



Dear C.A.S.E. Friend,

The work we do at C.A.S.E. is more important now than ever.

In October 2021, the American Academy of Pediatrics, American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, and the Children's Hospital Association came together to declare a National Emergency in Children's Mental Health, citing the serious toll of the pandemic on top of existing challenges.

This was quickly followed by the U.S. Surgeon General issuing an urgent Advisory on Protecting Youth Mental Health in December 2021, with emphasis on helping children who have or are experiencing foster care.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, mental health challenges were the leading cause of disability in young people, with 1 in 5 children ages 3 to 17 in the U.S. having a diagnosed mental health disorder.

We know that due to traumatic life experiences and compromised beginnings, many children who are adopted, being raised by relatives (kinship care), or who have experienced foster care have higher risks for developmental, health, emotional, behavioral, and academic challenges.

In addition, there are oftentimes complex racial, ethnic, and cultural issues inherent in families who adopt transracially or transculturally. Understanding and addressing the impact of these experiences is vital to positive outcomes.

For almost 25 years, C.A.S.E. has met this challenge with an array of direct services and educational resources for parents and professionals. Our current strategic plan, highlighted on the next page, will ensure our work continues to support families and build a network of skilled professionals.

3-Year Strategic Plan

At C.A.S.E., we remain committed to providing high quality adoption competent mental health services to all children and families and to building a national network of adoption competent professionals. We have refined our Vision and Mission (see cover) and embarked on a 3-year strategic plan to better serve adoptive, foster, and kinship networks based around four strategies:

1) Mental Health Services

Deliver best-in-class adoption competent care, psycho-education, and consultations globally, which are research-supported, evidence-based, family-focused, and trauma-informed.

2) Workforce Development and Practice

Grow our network of partners to advance adoption-competent practice in child welfare, mental health, and allied professions using state-of-the-art, accredited, and evidence-based curricula through our National Training Institute. Elevate professionals' practice with direct clinical experience, coaching, and a vibrant learning community through our National Demonstration and Teaching Clinic.

3) Research

Evaluate outcomes and impacts to develop and disseminate knowledge that improves treatment methods and educates the field.


4) Advocacy

Expand public awareness to inform and change public policy through clinical practice, research, training, and thought leadership.



Revenue









Our two Wendy's Wonderful Kids recruiters do child-focused recruitment to find families for children experiencing foster care with no identified adoptive families. Some of the youth we serve have complex needs including medically fragile conditions, autism, and significant developmental delay, with many non-verbal. Our recruiters have an active caseload of **12-15 children**. Due to the pandemic, their interactions with children, families, courts, and caseworkers were virtual. In 2021, our recruiters completed 1 adoption and 3 reunifications.



C.A.S.E., with our partners Children's Home Society, enCircle, and North American Council on Adoptable Children, served **128 children** and **99 families** with post-adoption services including case management, support groups, and respite events. These free services are available to adoptive families in Northern Virginia thanks to generous funding from the Virginia Department of Social Services.




